

M do not have any funds. In addition, the documents which Mr KOBAYASHI had forwarded to all delegates were not received in Venezuela.

H. KOBAYASHI: A revitalization of the Committees is essential. I request proposals from the delegates until the end of September.

Those reports of International Committees which were forwarded by the Secretariat shall not be distributed again; neither the reports which are distributed now during the Grand Council meeting.

M-3 Constitution and By-Laws

P. JACOBS: It is not necessary to change the Constitution, it shall be made clearer and the difference between the Constitution and By-Laws has to be clarified.

It is easier to change the By-Laws than the Constitution.
Jot CARPENTER: The Constitution has to be formulated much clearer.

Zvi MILLER: At the end of the Seventies our present Constitution and By-Laws have been newly formulated by a special Committee chaired by Philip TATTERSFIELD. Naturally these documents must be modified from time to time according to the changing circumstances.

Prof. A. SCHMID: As editor of the YEARBOOK he knows about the recent changes only in the English version. The French text should be changed accordingly.

Prof. P. JACOBS: Is ready to do this work for SFr 800.

H. KOBAYASHI: The Constitution is very important for IFLA, I support the suggestion of Arno SCHMID:

G. ANAGNOSTOPOULOS : Summarizes -

- 1.- The French text of the Constitution is not up to date;
- 2.- We need a translation done by a professional translator for the new amendments;
- 3.- It is said that the English text is not clear in some cases, thus it has to be improved.

Will all this be done by Professor JACOBS?

Prof. JACOBS: Is prepared to translate only the new amendments from English into French.

VOTE: Approved
2 abstentions

M-5 Education

Prof. J. CARPENTER: All information about existing Landscape Architecture programmes is now recorded in the computer and constantly updated. He can forward it directly on request.

M-6 Endangered Landscapes

The report of Committee Chairman Sveirung SKJOLD is distributed.

M-7 Finance

The Committee Chairman presented his report.

M

The proposal of Zvi MILLER, concerning advertisement in the YEARBOOK, is dealt with. While not in the room, Mr MILLER's motion is presented by Arno SCHMID:

"The Grand Council supports the proposal, that each member organization of IFLA voluntarily commits itself to seek advertising for the IFLA YEARBOOK in relation to the size of its own membership, i.e. 1/2 page of advertising for the first 150 members, and one additional full page of black and white advertising for each additional 150 members."

A discussion follows. A. SCHMID: We should try it.

Ms SKIBSTEDT: Very much in favour, but there might be difficulties with LANDSCAP.

Prof. STODDART: Thinks that this is too expensive.

J. FASUSI: In favour.

Th. OSMUNDSON: Seconded the motion ("let's try it!")

VOTE: 34 in favour

1 against

12 abstentions.

Discussion:

Ms KLIASS: To give courses in Landscape Architecture (related fields) from which IFLA could receive a percentage.

Th. OSMUNDSON: Advertisement could be increased: firms, universities, airlines etc. But this demands a lot of work and time and engagement. A Committee should work on this matter; in a big country like the States there are many possibilities; it is too much work for one person; this has to be done as an organized business work. Mr OSMUNDSON refers to H. KOBAYASHI's programme; to submit the programme to a foundation.

Z. MILLER: IFLA has many good programmes, but in order to realize them, we need money. Explains the situation of the Secretariat. In spite of constant growth in membership, tasks, responsibilities and efficiency, productivity is not unlimited.

The need of an Executive Director for IFLA is discussed. The situation of the Secretariat with only one permanent Executive Secretary is unbearable.

J. CARPENTER complains:

66%	go to the Secretariat
12%	to membership services
14%	to the Executive Committee
3%	to the Reserve

Secretary-General MRASS points out that the work of the Secretariat is in fact our most important "membership service".

Dame Sylvia CROWE and Sir Geoffrey JELLICOE join the Grand Council. A very impressive and moving moment.

Z. MILLER introduces the two foundation members of IFLA, shortly describing their vision and devotion to the development of the Federation and Landscape Architecture in its early days.

Sir Geoffrey addresses the Grand Council. Impressed and satisfied by the presence of so many delegates he expressed his hope for IFLA's further development.

M-8 Fund Raising

Hal MOGGRIDGE's comprehensive report on this subject was distributed to the delegates together with the G.C. Agenda. H. MOGGRIDGE explains the difficulties and obstacles to get funds; see report page 1 (a), (b).

M-9 Historical Gardens and Sites

Ms J. ABEL reports. Prof. PECHERE resigned as Chairman of the Committee on Historical Gardens and Sites. Ms ABEL reports on the excursion to England. Explains the collaboration with ICOMOS and how the Committee is connected with ICOMOS.

Charter of Florence: relation to Historical Gardens.

Z. MILLER: Is the Committee Historical Gardens and Sites financed by ICOMOS?

Ms ABEL agrees.

P. JACOBS mentions that most questions related to historical gardens belong to European gardens.

H. DORN wants to know how many IFLA members are involved in this Committee?

Ms ABEL explains that there are two categories of membership: Executive Committee and Corresponding members.

H. DORN suggests that ICOMOS information from Paris is forwarded to the IFLA Secretariat. Supported by H. KOBAYASHI, underlining that we need information.

M. MÖCSENYI requests Ms ABEL to express IFLA's warmest thanks to Mr PECHERE for his work.

M-10 Historical Landscapes

H. DORN gives his report.

M-11 Landscape Planning in Rural Areas

No report. Chairman Prof. BARTMAN has resigned. New Chairman not yet appointed.

M-12 Landscape Planning in Urban Areas

No report.

M-13 Legislation

Chairman FREEMAN resigned. New Chairman not yet appointed.

Suggestion to transform this Committee into a task force.

R. FREEMAN explains his decision: He has been Chairman of this Committee for nine years. That's long enough. He reports on his discussions with Chinese colleagues during his stay in China.

M-14 Media and Public Relations

Chairman Ian LYNE reports; his report is distributed.

M-15 PoliciesL-1 Strategy Plan for the Nineties

H. MOGGRIDGE proposes that the Grand Council accepts

H. KOBAYASHI's proposal to develop a Strategy Plan for the Nineties on the basis of his paper (L-1), to put in co-

ordination with Ewa KICINSKA's work in the Policies Committee.

"Delegates are to send any further comments to KOBAYASHI

by September 30, 1988. Papers exploring the relevant programmes

N FINANCES AND DUES

N-1 Report on the Landscape Architecture Foundation, LAF

This report was presented by Mr Spencer ELLIS.

N-2 Budget for 1989

Treasurer VOGEL's report was distributed.

F. VOGEL explains.

B. CLOUSTON Wants detailed explanation to point 01-02.

F. VOGEL: Mailings, Telephone, Telex, Fax.

P. JACOBS: There should be more support for the regions.

Money goes only into the Central Region, it should be distributed preferably to the periphery:

SFr 12.000 for regional activities

66.000 IFLA publications

11,000 membership services

Igor VOSKRESENSKI (USSR): This budget is very good elaborated.

We support this budget.

Motion P. JACOBS: "I move that the budget be approved with the following change: that SFr 14.000 be allocated to budget items 04-01 and 04-02 from any of the items listed under items 01 Secretariat, 02 Executive Committee, or 03 Grand Council meeting. This transfer will be made according to the best judgement of the Executive Committee within the current year, and the Executive Committee will decide how these sums are to be distributed to the regional Vice-Presidents and international Chairpersons."

Seconded by Ms KLIASS

VOTE: 36 in favour

8 abstentions

Approved.

N-2 Prof. CARPENTER proposed that IFLA's Headquarters/Secretariat should eventually be transferred from Versailles to another place where the expenses for the Secretariat would not exceed US Dollars 20.000 per annum.

J. BRIGHT: It should be investigated how to improve the management of IFLA's Secretariat.

H. KOBAYASHI: A task force should investigate this problem.

J. BRIGHT: There shall be alternative proposals.

G. ANAGNOSTOPOULOS: We should investigate all possibilities; this belongs to the Strategy of the Nineties. We can obtain an answer if we gather all information. This should be taken into consideration.

J. BRIGHT: IFLA's Secretariat has to be improved.

H. KOBAYASHI: This is a part of the Strategy Plan and has to be dealt together with it.

Prof. J. STODDART: The work of the Secretariat could be done by a university's staff.

H. DORN: Examine the effectiveness of the Committees, reduce costs in this field, p.e. "Translation of Technical Terms".

P. JACOBS: The proposal of J. CARPENTER would mean an amendment to Art. XI of the Constitution.

Motion: Increase the effectiveness of IFLA's Secretariat, alternative proposals, at lower costs but under condition that the quality of work is assured.

VOTE: 29 in favour
10 against
4 abstentions

B. WOERNER: The Executive Committee should be reorganized. President, President elect, 3 Vice-Presidents.

An Executive Vice-President to be employed at Headquarters.

W. MRASS, H. KOBAYASHI, WOERNER shall review this 1989 in Manila.

J. CARPENTER seconds.

General funds shall be allocated for the Executive-Director. That the Constitution be amended to reorganize the Executive Committee of IFLA as follows:

the President, the President-elect, the three Regional Vice-Presidents.

This proposal will eliminate the position of the First Vice-President, the Secretary-General, the Treasurer, the Immediate Past President from the Executive Committee.

A full explanation of this proposal will be sent to all delegates more than six months before the next Grand Council meeting. In connection with this re-organization it is proposed that an Executive Vice-President be employed as the operations officer at IFLA Headquarters and assume the duties of the Secretary-General and the Treasurer.

G. ANAGNOSTOPOULOS: Expresses a very pessimistic opinion to the above proposal. We need the necessary money to fulfill our work satisfactory.

H. KOBAYASHI: This is a very important matter. Here and now is not the right place to decide on this issue.

J. CARPENTER: If three members will propose this six months prior to Manila it has to be put on the Agenda.

N-2 VOTE: 31 in favour
2 against
7 abstentions
Approved.

N-3 Proposal for a more suitable dues formula

P. JACOBS mentions that we have made great progress; we have a programme and a proposal for a strategy for the nineties.

O ANY OTHER MATTERS

Ms FAJARDO: Mentions the Mexican symposium in Mexico City.

J. BRIGHT: All conferences, seminars, symposia have to be co-ordinated.

Prof. OH: Those countries in the neighbourhood of Korea shall exchange professionals; in 1992 the IFLA World Congress will take place in Korea, we will do our best to be well prepared.

T. NAITO, Chairman of the Eastern Regional Council assumes that Korea shall have full assistance.

Ms BARTON: Announces that Sunday, 7.00 p.m. there will be a lecture with slides on Landscape Architecture in the Sowjet Union.

Igor VOSKRESENSKI expresses his warmest thanks to the Grand Council for the friendly admittance of the Soviet association. He invites the delegates to visit the Soviet Union.

B. WOERNER: Underlines the necessity to re-establish relationship to those countries that have not paid dues and do not receive membership services.

Z. MILLER: Explains that we are trying all possible ways even by contacts with individual members in order to re-establish relations. He reports on the situation in Indonesia. A powerful Chapter in Jakarta; members of the association attend IFLA Congresses, but are not appointed to represent their country on the Grand Council.

India: There exists a national association, an Institute of Landscape Architects, but delegate RAY is abroad. Many individual Landscape Architects have written to the association and never received any response.


IFLA cannot interfere in internal quarrels of associations.

Mr President,
Ladies and Gentlemen,
Dear Colleagues,

Europe is a rather complex matter

Dozens of cultures !
Dozens of languages !
Big countries, middle-sized but wilful countries, small countries and tiny states.

Taking up a common action is even more difficult considering the diversity and spontaneity of Europe.

Our President, supported by his Executive Committee and our Central Region Vice-President, manages the IFLA under the conditions we already know.

As far as the Regional Council of Europe is concerned, we have timidly and carefully begun to help the northern part of the Central Region.

Although it can't be denied that the landscape as such has no limits, one still tends, in "good old Europe", to confuse gardens with landscapes, public open spaces with gardens and gardening with landscape planning.

One timid attempt to inform the public (an attempt which was limited to the twelve capitals of EEC Europe) was made in Brussels, 5 months ago.

On a surface of approximatively 900m², plans of the landscape and public open spaces of European capitals were shown to a vast public (500'000 visitors).

The exhibition, which could be defined as "a landscape art gallery", was attended by Presidents of State, ministers and ambassadors of about thirty countries, as well as the representatives of the capitals involved.

Our aim was

- 1. to measure spontaneity at all levels and
- 2. to look for trustees who would support spontaneity.

During that time, the following events, which were all under the trusteeship of Mr -Louis THYS, Secretary of State, were organized:

- 1. An Award of Landscape Architecture, which was handed over to the authors of the Bruges-project for their structure plan of urban landscape (refer to N° 22 of IFLA NEWS). Note that,

in order to participate, an international recognition, i.e. from IFLA, was required.

2. A stand with three pyramids symbolizing the "three stages" made it possible for the visitors to become familiar with the "project" as the first stage, "planning" as the second stage and "management" as the third stage in the development of green space and landscape.
3. International communications on "D-Day", 9th February 1988: on that day, which was dedicated to the study, Professor Arno S. Schmid and Mrs Ingrid Bourne, in front of an audience of 500 people, all involved in the three steps of Landscape Architecture, highlighted the close link between the project itself, planning and management.

Due to the official and international aspect of the Brussels initiative, the Honorary President of IFLA, Mr Zvi Miller, submitted a motion that became a convention to the authorities which were present.

CONVENTION

After having analysed both Mr Jean Louis THYS' conclusions (Secretary of State of the Region of Brussels) and the suggestions made by Mr Zvi Miller (Imm. Past President of the International Federation of Landscape Architects, IFLA), the delegates of the European capitals (EEC), who had gathered in Brussels on the 9th February 1988, commonly accepted the following resolution:

Introductory Principle of the Resolution

The capitals of urban areas undertake to promote cities in developing countries, with a view to furthering

- the study,
- the organization
- and the planning of the landscape in general and public open spaces in particular.

Contents of the Resolution

The resolution comprises three sections:

First section helping to bring about municipal services for public open spaces and for the landscape.

Second section: helping to set up schools or universities providing training in Landscape Architecture.

Third section: helping to promote the training of specialists in the planning and the management of the Landscape in general and of public open spaces in particular.

Phase 1:

The Region of Brussels and the City of Brussels, with the help of the International Federation of Landscape Architects (IFLA) are jointly going to start with the elaboration of an agreement file for a city chosen by the Region and the City of Brussels.

Phase 2:

Other European capitals will also undertake similar steps so as to cover a maximum of capitals and cities of developing countries.

Phase 3:

Other European or non-European cities will continue under the auspices of IFLA to assist other cities of developing countries on the basis of the experience made in the first two phases.

This convention, called "The Brussels Convention", has been accepted and phase 1 is being set up.

An unexpected and spontaneous result !

From now on, the exhibition Garden-Park-Forest (Ugexpo) will therefore be called "International exhibition Garden-Park-Forest and will definitely be set under the theme of Landscape Architecture.

I propose to my European colleagues to extend this experience beyond little old Europe and develop a far-reaching understanding, from Norway right down to Greece and from Portugal right up to the Soviet Union.

Since then, we have not undertaken any further activities; nevertheless, those days have made us understand what we need nowadays;

- to integrate landscape into society, i.e. into politics in the noble sense of the word;
- to unify European terminology without erasing contrasts;
- to normalise universities and create an academy, a (European) teaching institute of Landscape Planning and Architecture (mainly aimed at underdeveloped countries with insufficient teaching facilities);
- to establish a data base at European level;
- to create a European Award of Landscape Architecture.

The activities of our International Federation merge those of the Magician's International in Boston.

Many thanks to the organisers for having put us under the same roof as the Magicians !

REPORT OF THE FINANCE CHAIRMAN

INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTS

In 1986, a five year comparison of IFLA finances for the years 1981 through 1985 was provided. This report continues with a comparison for the years 1984 through 1987 along with the 1988 Budget.

This report clearly shows:

- (1) That expenses each year through 1986 were in excess of income and that IFLA was accruing liabilities. The lack of income from the proposed World Congress in 1986 contributed to a deficit of (55'068 SF) at the end of 1986.
- (2) That the wise decision of the delegates at the 1986 Grand Council meeting to adopt a very limited budget and call for a voluntary assessment from member associations has saved IFLA from bankruptcy.
- (3) That the accrued liabilities and bank debits at the end of 1987, (40'806 SF), will be balanced against the cash in the bank and accounts receivable, 54'084 SF, to provide a carry-over of 13'278 SF, which is almost the total of the voluntary assessment in the amount of 20% of the prior years membership fees. This gives IFLA a small reserve for the first time.
- (4) The 1988 budget shows the increased income from membership fees and provides funding for Executive Committee, Grand Council, and Membership Services. The Yearbook is to be funded from advertising revenue. It also includes a Reserve Fund as recommended by the Finance Committee.

The President, Treasurer and the Executive Committee are to be commended for following the 1987 budget closely and placing IFLA in a sound financial position for the first time.

Refinements of financial statements should be continued to make it possible to determine all costs of each program - including telephone, postage, personal secretariat and other expense, so that the delegates can approve a budget providing for the best distribution of IFLA income and expense in the future.

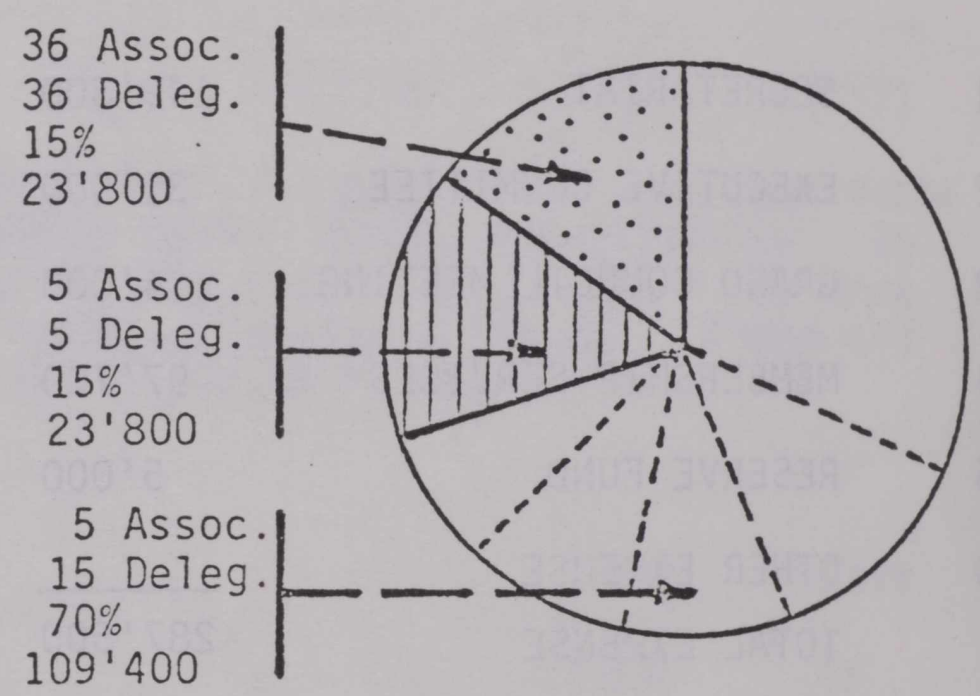
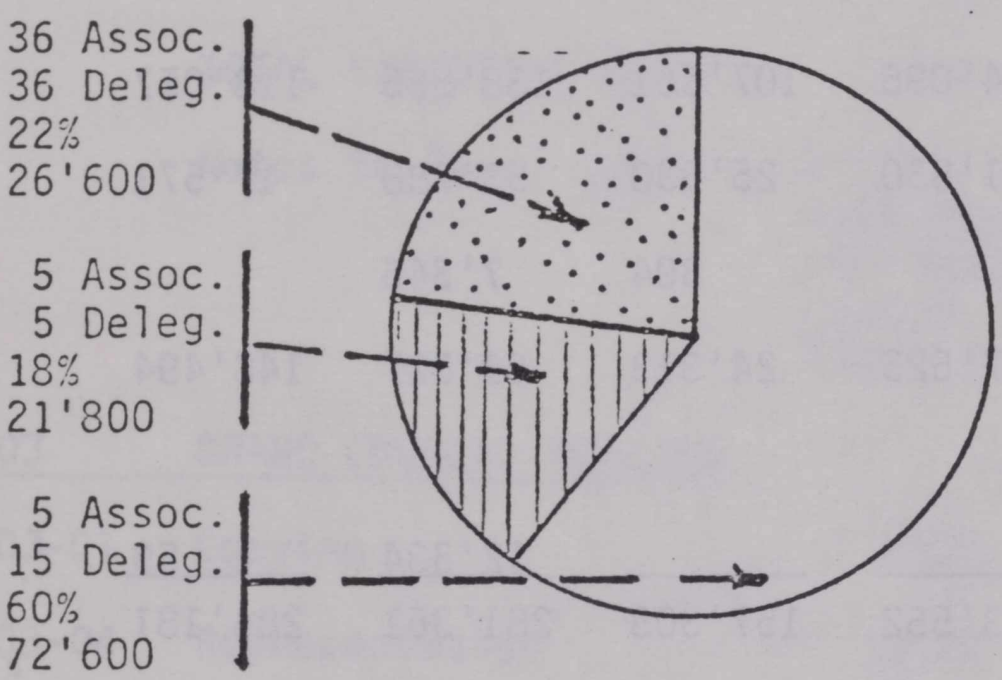
COMPARISON OF ASSOCIATION CONTRIBUTIONS AND PROPORTIONATE EXPENSE

1987 - 121'000

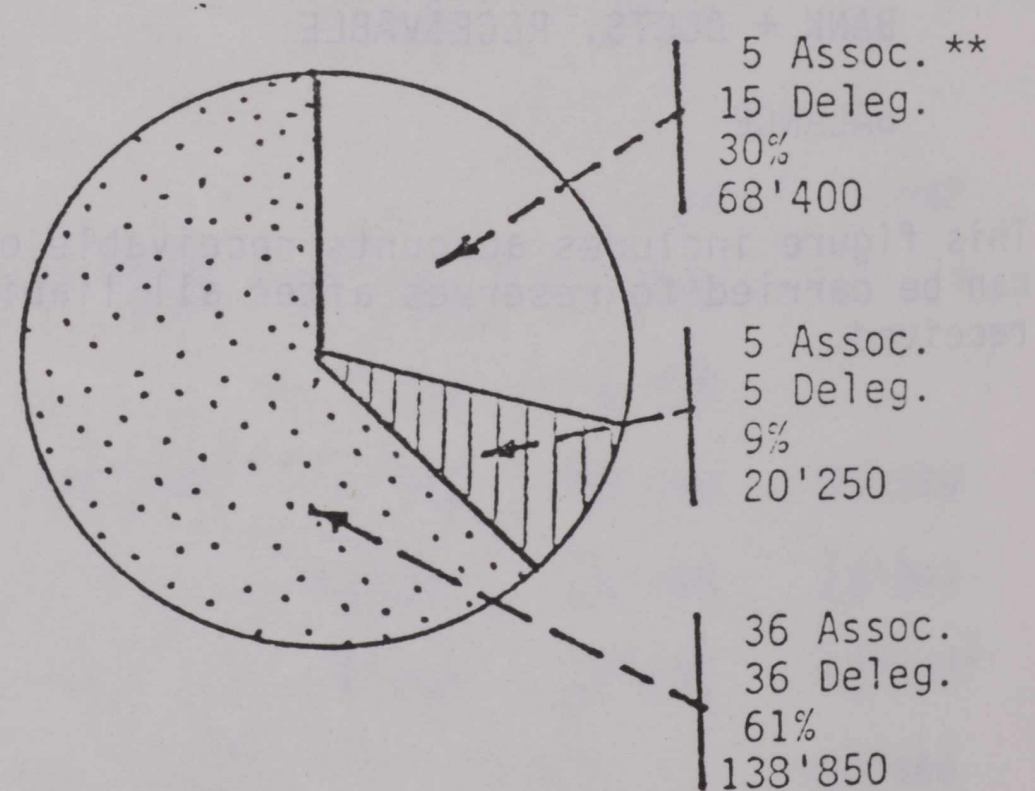
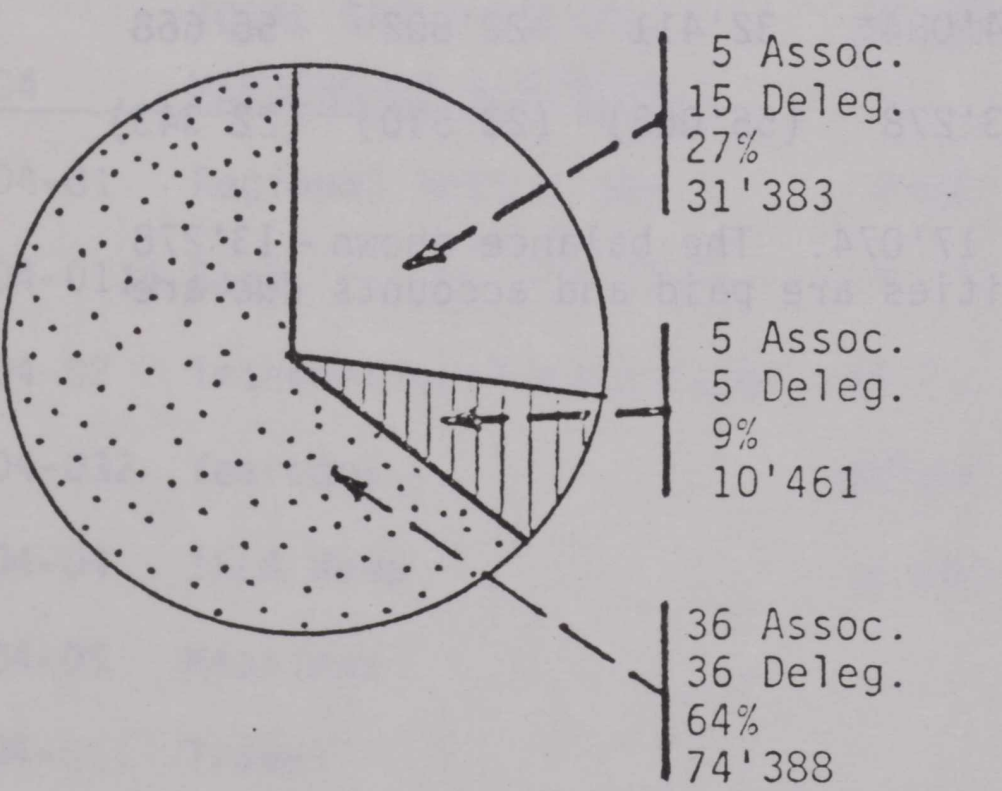
1988 - 157'000 (budget)

INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION FOR LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE STUDENTS SPONSORED BY THE INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTS AND THE PHILIPPINE ASSOCIATION OF LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTS AND UNESCO.

COMPETITION GUIDELINES AND RULES

ART. 1

Introduction

The International Federation of Landscape Architects (IFLA) and the Philippine Association of Landscape Architects (PALA) announce the 1989 International Landscape Architectural Students Design Competition, to be held in conjunction with IFLA XXVI World Congress, scheduled from May 30 to June 2, 1989 in Manila, Philippines. The Congress theme will be "The Realities of the Tropics - A Challenge".

ART. 2

Objectives of the competition

IFLA and PALA's objectives, in organizing this Competition are four-fold:
- to recognize superior environmental design achievement by those enrolled in landscape architectural programs;
- to bring international attention to the works of promising students;
- to further encourage the highest standards of landscape architectural education;
- to demonstrate IFLA's commitment to, and support of landscape architectural students in all regions of the world.

ART. 3

Object of the competition

Participants must submit landscape projects showing high social relevance (as urban parks, recreation areas, townscape design, playgrounds, restoration of derelict land, etc.) with strong emphasis on ecological issues, on popular participation and attention to images of the local vernacular landscape. Project costs must be kept to a minimum through the use of indigenous materials and/or innovative design with special emphasis on low maintenance costs. The setting of the projects should be intended in a developing country or in a marginal area where big economic investments are not possible.

ART. 4

Entry

a - The competition is open to all students enrolled in landscape architectural programs recognized by IFLA. Entries will also be accepted from individuals or working groups of graduates of landscape architectural programs who, since the completion of their studies, have not taken a permanent work position

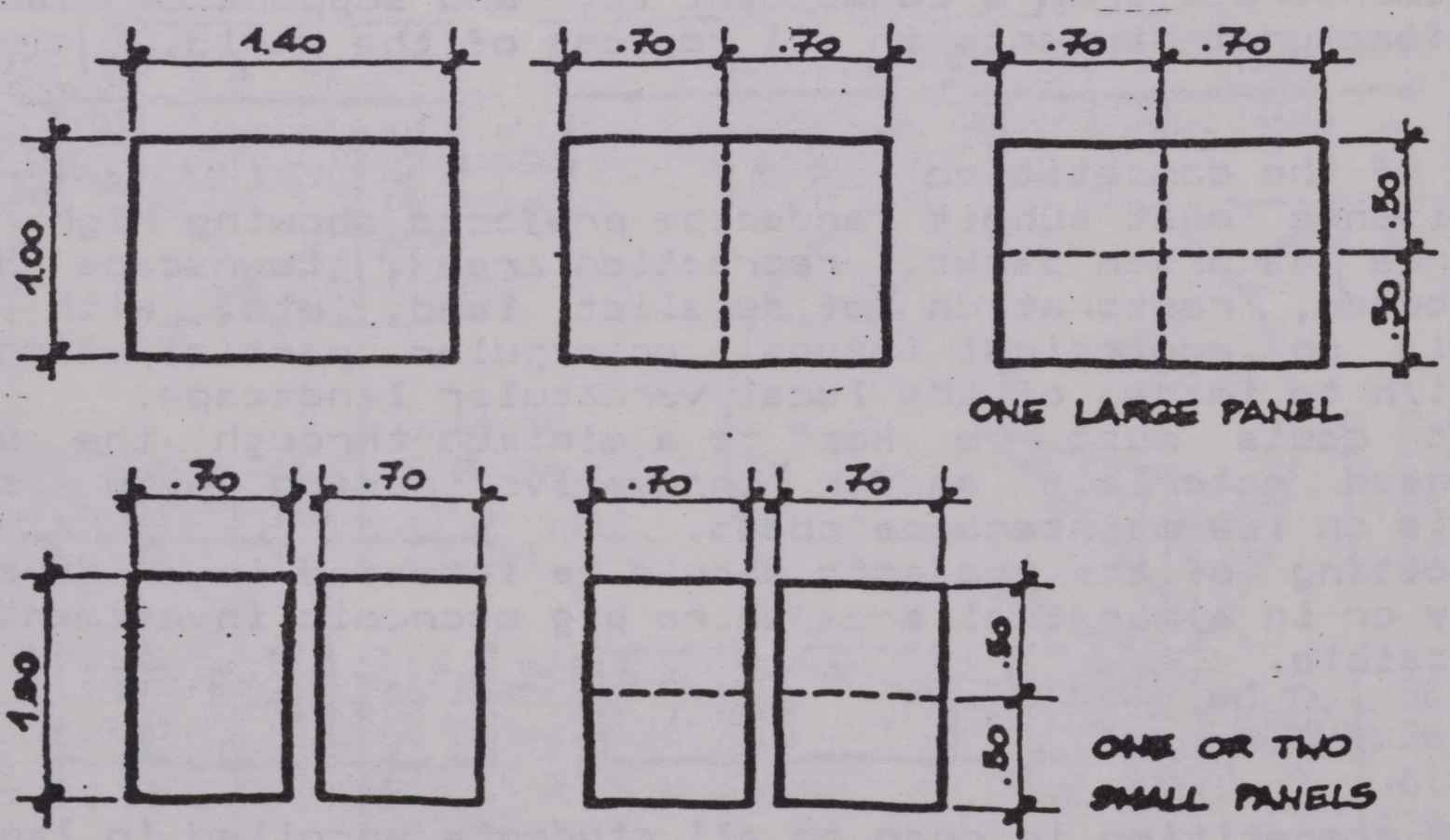
and are not currently employed in the profession.

- b - Both individual and group submissions will be accepted, and each student or group is permitted only one entry. Broad inter-disciplinary submissions are encouraged and will be accepted where it has been demonstrated that leadership responsibility for the entry has been taken by one or more of those landscape architectural students involved in the submission.
- c - The following may not enter the competition : collaborators and associates of members of the jury, their relatives up to the third degree; any person incompatible by law or under special regulations, unless otherwise officially authorized.

ART. 5

Submission requested

- A maximum of one panel of 100x140 centimetres or two panels of 100x70 centimetres each. They can be broken down to two or four 50x70 centimetres panels for mailing convenience. In such cases, clear indication for their reassemblage must be given.
- Panel must include all informations. No additional material will be accepted.
- Any two dimensional presentation media may be used to communicate the design intent of the submission.
- No three-dimensional models will be accepted.
- Legends, captions and all other text associated with the submission shall be in English or French.
- The panel(s) can be sent flat or rolled up. Panels folded or in dimensions less than 50x70 centimetres will not be accepted.



ART. 6

Illustratives enclosures

All work is to be submitted anonymously with an opaque sealed envelope. The opaque envelope has to be firmly sealed and contain the name and address of the participant(s) and the participant(s)' written signed statement attesting to their true authorship of all work submitted in the competition entry. For this declaration, the accompanying form is to be used (see Enclosure 2). As entries are received, serial numbers will be affixed to both the submitted panel(s) and the envelope. The envelope will be opened after the jury decisions have been made.

ART. 7

Publication of Guidelines and rules, terms of entry and submission of schemes

The competition Guidelines and rules shall be issued to all recognized schools of landscape architecture by October 15, 1988 through IFLA and PALA.

Questions from participants concerning the competition must be received before December 31, 1988 in writing to :

Packages received after the deadline date will not be admitted, regardless of their postmark date.

The results of the competition will be announced by the jury immediately following the judging session and the official awards ceremony will take place during the closing session of the Congress. Awards will be handed over by IFLA's President.

ART. 8

The judges' panel

The competition jury will be composed of seven members :

- the Chairman of IFLA International Committee on Student Competitions;
- the President of PALA;
- the four Vice-Presidents of IFLA.

In the event that a member of the competition jury ascertains that one or more of the entries are known to him/her either directly or indirectly, this must be communicated immediately to the awards jury chairman. In such a situation the jury member

must then withdraw from the judge

ART. 9

Prizes and Awards

A "UNESCO Prize for Landscape Architecture" will be awarded for the first time at the Manila Congress, worth US \$ 7.000.

Additional prizes and awards will be offered.

All participants whose entries meet the conditions of the competition rules will receive a certificate of participation. At the same time, any university, college, school or other institution giving strong support to the competition and/or producing award-winning entries will be given citations. Also institutions in which award recipients are or have been enrolled will be formally advised of competition results.

ART. 10

Publication and exhibition of projects submitted

All competition entries are the property of IFLA and PALA and entries will not be returned to the authors. IFLA and PALA retain the right of duplication and publication of the material submitted to the competition which, in their own unquestionable opinion, they deem to be interesting, without thereby putting themselves under any obligation whatsoever to the entrants concerned.

The works submitted by award recipients will be placed on exhibition for the duration of IFLA's XXVI World Congress.

ART. 11

Duties and obligations of entrants

Participation in the competition implies the contextual and unconditional acceptance of the contents of the competition rules.

All entrants are absolutely forbidden to publish or to have their submissions (or any part thereof) published prior to notification of the jury's final decisions.

ART. 12

Regulations in the event of dispute

The members of the jury are the sole arbiters at all levels up until the final attribution of prizes.

Any and every dispute that cannot be referred either to the working of the jury or to the attribution of prizes shall be settled by arbitration by the IFLA Executive Committee.

Enclosure 1

RULES OF THE "UNESCO PRIZE FOR LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE"

1. Purpose

The "UNESCO Prize for Landscape Architecture" is to be awarded to a student in Landscape Architecture, who is the author of a work inspired specifically by the aims of UNESCO.

2. Periodicity

Unless otherwise decided by the General Conference of UNESCO, the prize shall be awarded every year on the occasion of the World Congress of the International Federation of Landscape Architects.

3. Choice of Winner

The winner of the "UNESCO Prize for Landscape Architecture" shall be selected by the Director-General, on the recommendation of the jury, from the winners of the international competition between students in Landscape Architecture organized by the International Federation of Landscape Architects (IFLA), in accordance with the rules laid down by the Federation in this matter.

4. Jury

The jury for the UNESCO Prize shall be the same as that for the competition.

5. Value of the Prize

The prize shall be worth US \$ 3.500 annually, subject to any alteration in this amount decided by the General Conference of UNESCO.

6. Method of awarding the Prize

The prize shall be awarded to the winner at the IFLA Congress, or at UNESCO Headquarters, or in the home country of the winner by a representative of the Director-General.

7. Criteria for Award of the Prize

- (i) It must effectively contribute to improving the average standard of Landscape Architecture as well as Urban and Regional Planning;
- (ii) It must reflect the winner's interest in environmental problems;
- (iii) It must take into account both the practical features of the work proposed and the aesthetic requirements which it must satisfy.

ANNUAL REPORT 1987/88
to IFLA's GRAND COUNCIL in BOSTON, JULY 1988

by Chairman SVEINUNG SKJOLD

ENDANGERED LANDSCAPES ... all landscapes are endangered landscapes today. So why this committee? May be the problems are too enormous, too complex and out of scale for IFLA. Why do we care? Is this task for a small group of highly specialised professionals like ours?

The question has been raised outside and within IFLA, and one has to admit it is a question which should concern every landscape architect in any country of the world.

If the answer is YES, as I think it is, we do care about the future of our landscapes, our entire environment, then the landscape architect with her/his ecological background and design training and experience has got an important and vital contribution to make, in helping to avoid dangers and disasters, and to plan with the Nature as a partner.

In recognition of IFLA's.. and the profession's responsibility to promote a better understanding and more professional solutions to environmental and ecological problems, IFLA's Committee on Endangered Landscapes was established in March 1980.

Through correspondance, annuai meetings in connection with IFLA's G.C., and an exploitation of generous colleagues, the committee has put considerable work into :

1. A DEFINITION of 'Endangered Landscapes', particularly those landscapes which can be protected by scientific and design skills of the landscape architect.
2. A GENERAL DESCRIPTION of the work of the landscape architect, as defined by ILO, underlining the specialist skills which qualify some landscape architects to undertake work related to endangered landscapes.
3. A CLASIFICACION of 'Endangered Landscapes' by cause of danger. Natural drought and erosion. Man-made drought and erosion due to migration, agricultural practice, over population, over-use of fuel gathering. Exploitation of temperate forest, tropical hard-wood, minerals, water supplies. Hydro-electric power, roads, harbour, airport and recreational development



- 4. A GEOGRAPHICAL REVIEW of 'Endangered Landscapes' identifying critical areas of the world, where combinations of circumstances give rise to growing problems. Problems which could effectively be tackled with the appropriate political will to back existing scientific and planning skills.
- 5. COLLECTING CASEBOOK EXAMPLES of relevant projects and successful planning from all continents.

PUBLICATIONS AND FUTURE WORK

A major achievement was a special issue of the swiss three-linguistic professional magazin ANTHOS, entirely dedicated the theme 'Endangered Landscapes', which was the result of a close and thorough working together by the committee itself and a number of colleagues from many countries.

The committee is working on a more comprehensive publication. Collecting of casebook examples is going on continuously, and we do hope to make some progress within the coming year. The committee's intention on this point is to see our future work and reports as a modest "follow up" after the UN-World Commission on Environment and Development report: OUR COMMON FUTURE.

The committee also intend to arrange an 'Endangered Landscape Conference' in Kenya, preferably in cooperation with UNEP. This, and other topics of current interest will be discussed at the committee meeting in Boston.

The committee has been practicing an "open door policy" which has resulted in altogether 15 members from 10 different countries. This has been a stimulating factor, even if the relative large number of members makes the correspondance more demanding and costly.

Our future activity also will depend on the good collegiate spirit and support, not only from the committee members, but from all delegates, individual members and observers within IFLA. The committee therefore welcome any constructive ideas, suggestions and comments.

REPORT

COMMITTEE HISTORICAL LANDSCAPES

Last year's activities of the Committee have been characterized by the compilation of a catalogue on Historical Landscapes. Said catalogue is to be elaborated on the basis of a system subdivided into three categories. Enclosed please find three examples which may serve as patterns.

Category 1 : Historical, protected Landscapes.
The protection of these Landscapes is sufficient and seems to be optimal.

Category 2 : Historical Landscapes which are protected, the scope of protection however not being sufficient, particularly insufficient from the organizational point of view.

Category 3 : Non-protected, historically valuable Landscapes.

The catalogue aims at describing a number of endangered Historical Landscapes and at supporting efforts for the preservation of said Landscapes. It shall be handed over to UNESCO, which is also engaged in preservation and protection.

The IFLA seminar in Poland in 1986 has already treated these three aspects of Historical Landscapes, and in this year's symposium in the IFLA Central Region of Athens (Sept. 23 to 26, 1988) the aesthetical, ecological and cultural values of Historical Landscapes will be talked about and discussed.

Another seminar of our Committee, which is to take place in the Mediterranean Area, is being prepared; this area is characterized by a large number of endangered landscapes which are worth being protected. The Past President, Dr. Werkmeister, already endeavoured to carry out a seminar of this kind.

It was agreed with our magazine ANTHOS that probably next year, a whole edition will be dedicated to Historical Landscapes. A larger public and, above all, politicians should thus be made aware of the heritage of these Historical Landscapes and of the fact that they need to be protected.

On the occasion of the seminar in Rotterdam in May 1988, the President, Professor Möcsényi, the Secretary-General, Professor Walter Mrass and several members of our Committee discussed that eventually, the Committee "Historical Landscapes" and the Committee "Historical Gardens" may form a joint Committee. This will be subject of discussion during our meeting in Boston.

The Committee is compiling a library on Historical Landscapes and invites all IFLA delegates to send us books on this subject.

Contacts should be established with other organizations striving for the same objectives. Moreover, contacts should be deepened with the American ICOMOS Committee "Historical Gardens and Sites" as well as the Italian "Italia Nostra".

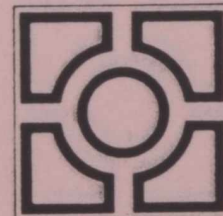

The Secretary-General Ms Jette ABEL announced that there were 45 votes, see attendance list.

A-4 Minutes of the Jamaica meeting

The Report of Professor John STODDART shall be included in the Minutes. Proposal of Professor Arno S. SCHMID, seconded by Hal MOGGRIDGE. Approved unanimously.

A-5 The PARIS Congress

Ms Ingrid BOURNE reported on the forthcoming Congress, the importance of the Institute of France, and that Mme Simone VEIL would attend the reception at l'Hôtel de Ville of Paris and address the Congress participants.

Immediate Past President Zvi MILLER announced IFLA's recent admission into Category 'A' of UNESCO, and explained the prestige for the profession resulting from this upgrading. Landscape Architects are now in the same Category as Architects.

D FORMER RESOLUTIONS

D-1 20% Emergency payment (1986)

- clearer formulation -

Professor Jef de GRUYSE read which countries have paid the emergency payment. He wanted to know how the United Kingdom explains their letter in this matter.

Hal MOGGRIDGE "This is only a technical matter and not a matter of principle."

de GRUYSE: motion:

The emergency payment should be paid before December 1987; the question should be clarified before December of this year; seconded by Zvi MILLER.

The question was discussed whether the emergency payment is based on voluntary payment or not.

Mr Arno SCHMID: At the Ocho Rios Grand Council meeting it was difficult to understand the exact meaning of the motion. This resulted in different interpretations, but he reads in his notes:

1. For 1987 the 5 greatest member countries of IFLA should raise their dues in the category from SFr 7,-- to SFr 10,--.
2. For 1986 each member country should seek to pay an emergency payment of 20% of their 1986 dues. How does USA interpret this?

Raymond FREEMAN: 1. For 1987 the 5 greatest member countries shall raise their dues from SFr 7,-- to SFr 10,--. 2. The contribution of 20% of membership dues of 1986 has been misunderstood; only after the Minutes of Jamaica were received I learned that it should be 20%.

There was a discussion whether only the 5 greatest member countries should raise their dues or not.

Haruto KOBAYASHI: Japan understood it like Arno SCHMID. We have to handle these two points separately.

Sveinung SKJOLD: Supports the opinion of SCHMID and KOBAYASHI; he understood the matter in the same manner in Jamaica. This had to be a voluntary payment, and that should be mentioned in letters which will be sent now.

Mr Robert WOERNER: There has to be voted on de GRUYSE's motion.

YES means mandatory

NO means voluntary

VOTE: YES 1 vote (mandatory)
5 abstentions
NO all others (voluntary)

D-2 "No national association pays more than 25% of total dues" (1981)

Ms Marga MIELGO points out:

Cancel the agreement of Vancouver 1981.

In Jamaica a Committee on dues was established chaired by Theodore OSMUNDSON who reads his report and explains it.

(see the relevant report)

There was a discussion: 1. whether first of all the 25% have to be abolished (Prof. JACOBS), or whether the 25% clause has ever been dealt with together with the other dues matters (Prof. BELLAFIORE).

2. Why the Council has asked a Committee to handle this matter and now the President comes with a new proposal (M. SCHJETNAN). Arno SCHMID made clear:

The proposal of Th. OSMUNDSON did not come in time, and it is the duty of the PRESIDENT to seek for a solution. The President and the Treasurer have worked out a constructive proposal, we have therefore to thank them.

E FINANCES AND DUES

E-1 A sound financial strategy to meet IFLA's increasing responsibilities

The PRESIDENT confirmed this statement and reads his proposal. In the following discussion Professor MRASS pleads for equality because all receive the same services, but the increase of dues can be dealt with in a different manner, depending on countries and possibilities.

Ms BOURNE claims for a Federation that develops activities but not one that just keeps itself alive.

Mr SGARAVATTI points out: IFLA is essential for us, for the profession. We need the Federation, and we are ready to pay the 20,-- SFr per capita with pleasure.

Mr MORTENSEN raised the question: Are the individuals members of IFLA or is an association member?

Zvi MILLER: The dues are based on the number of members of each association. Not a new dues system is needed, but a new approach. We should continue with what the foundation members had in mind. Every individual contributes to the welfare of the Federation.

Hal MOGGRIDGE points out: The U.K. pays more than every other country in relation to others. The money should be spent in the right way. In case that this motion is accepted, IFLA will be destroyed.

The following discussion is concentrated on the points, whether the money is spent in the right way, do we need real programmes first (JACOBS) or do we have plenty of ideas but lack of money (WERKMEISTER).

Professor A. SCHMID says that it is not possible to achieve 100% justice for everyone. When Germany joined IFLA in 1950 we paid SFr 18,-- per capita. That means today SFr 40,-- actually. IFLA is more active than many other NGOs and even more active than governmental associations. It is our duty to protect the environment for mankind. Is it for a colleague in Georgia more difficult to pay SFr 18,-- or 20,-- than for a colleague in Malawi? Please let's not go back!
This point was accepted.

But I should like to know something of a very precise programme (JACOBS).

2. H. KOBAYASHI : The Japanese delegation supports Mr OSMUNDSON but believes at the same time that a discussion about the future strategy of IFLA is necessary. If we have the results the finances have to be new structured within a timetable. If it is possible to do that there should be no further problems with the dues of IFLA members.

Motion tabled by Hal MOGGRIDGE:

From 1988, Grand Council adopts without any maximum ceiling the scale of dues defined by Attachment B no 2 tabled by the Ad Hoc Committee chaired by T. OSMUNDSON, namely:

Abolition of the 25% clause.

F-2 Re-instatement of full membership rights

President MÖCSENYI reports on the re-instatement of full membership rights of SARP, the Polish Association of Landscape Architects.

F-3 Suspension of membership rights

ABAP - (Brazil) has paid all debts.

ILI - (Indian Landscape Institute) suspended.

ILA - (South Africa) Mr Goister got the facts clear. Confirmed that outstanding dues will be paid.

F-4 The Institute of South Africa's membership in IFLA

Ms SKIBSTEDT, Denmark reads the reports.

Asks for apologies for the word "terrorist". The membership of South Africa should be canceled.

Mr CLOUSTON: a discussion of not more than 10 minutes should follow.

IFLA is non-political and is an organization of professionals. Long discussion.

Mr GOISTER: IFLA is non-political. We are a professional organization. It is ILA's aim to integrate black Landscape Architects. We are explaining the profession at High Schools. There are black students for Landscape Architecture, and within six years we shall have black Landscape Architects in ILA and in South Africa. We need the experience etc. of IFLA: All would become easier if IFLA helped us. There is a university in South Africa offering Landscape Architecture, and there are no restrictions for black people to attend the courses. I agree that our letter was a mistake. I am going back to our Institute, and I will recommend them to abstain from this letter.

S.SKJOLD points out that Denmark should be informed by the delegate that this matter has been dealt with in detail.

The members in South Africa have to be informed that it is very difficult for all Scandinavian countries to accept the letter that was written by ILA.

The Grand Council votes against, end of discussion.

Mr CABRAL wants to state the following:

- 1.- Our Federation is a Nongovernmental Federation.
 - 2.- Our Federation is strictly professional.
- There does not exist any kind of discrimination.

A. SCHMID:

- 1.- The International Federation of Landscape Architects is non-political (Article I.1 of the Constitution).
- 2.- It works to achieve its goals of developing and promoting the profession of Landscape Architecture as outlined in the Constitution of IFLA.
- 3.- It expects its members to adhere to this Constitution as specifically called for under Article II.7.
- 4.- It notes with alarm that in correspondence to the Executive Committee and to the Delegates by one member, certain statements have been made that are insulting to another member and are not acceptable to the Grand Council.

P. JACOBS: Arno SCHMID made a proposal how this matter could be dealt with.

Mr CLOUSTON: We have to act in conformity with the Constitution.

A. SCHMID: The Executive Committee was wrong to put this item on the Agenda.

Jot CARPENTER: The proposal of A. SCHMID is a substitute motion, and he made the motion to substitute the proposal of A. SCHMID.

E-2 Budget for 1988

The TREASURER reads the new budget. ANNEX XVIII.

Zvi MILLER: Draws the attention to the considerable financial cuts in comparison with the distributed budget. Which criteria led to those cuts?

A major problem is the Congress in the U.S.A., and how much money can be expected. Up to date we don't have any information on this. It would be the right moment to discuss this matter now.

Robert WOERNER: It should be dealt with now.

The Secretariat in Versailles is understaffed.

01-011 : Assistant Secretary : what is the scope of duties?

01-010 : Executive Secretary.

V. BELLAFIORE: There should be an Assistant Secretary if the work is arising (temporary).

Z. MILLER: Did not get an answer concerning his question about registration fees from the expected 3 - 4 thousand participants at the 1988 Congress.

Mr VOGEL: From this Congress (France) we can expect 20 - 30 thousand SFr. The budget is prepared in a conservative manner! Keep income low, keep expense high. We have to pay the liabilities; we do not know the registration fees of the Congress. It is our intention to adopt the budget.

S. SKJOLD refers to 02-01, 02-02: There is no money for the members of the Executive Committee.

As a matter of principle it should be made sure that every member of the Executive Committee is enabled to participate at the meetings.

P. JACOBS: The proposal of Mr SKJOLD should be an amendment for this budget. There is no necessity to vote, but it should be taken into consideration.

Mr OELRICHS: It should be mentioned in the Minutes.

VOTE: 40 in favor

The budget was adopted.

G CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

G-1 The membership categories of IFLA enabling formation of regional associations (Professor JACOBS)

Changes of the Constitution. (see relevant document)

VOTE: unanimously accepted (47 votes)

G 2 The composition of the Executive Committee

two changes:

- 1.- elimination of the post of the First Vice-President;
- 2.- change the status of the Immediate Past President into an ad hoc position.

Reason: to cut down the costs, - budget!

Long and vehement discussion follows.

MRASS raised the question is it legal to vote at the same time on two officers? He asked for a separated voting.

H. MOGGRIDGE: "Adoption of the amendments to the Constitution affecting the First Vice-President should be deferred for two years, so that Mr KOBAYASHI may have the opportunity to serve on the Executive Committee."

This motion was ruled to be constitutionally impossible.

P. JACOBS: We had in mind to reduce the Executive Committee, to eliminate the position of the First Vice-President and to change the status of the Immediate Past President.

T. OSMUNDSON: The Executive Committee of IFLA shall be changed to include a President, 3 Regional Vice-Presidents, a Secretary-General, a Treasurer and a Past President. The Past President shall be an ad hoc member without vote of the Executive Committee. The Regional Vice-President from the President's Region shall act as President in absence of the President.

VOTE: 29 in favor
19 against
1 abstention

The counting of this vote had different results and therefore it was decided that G.C. members with voting right should put their decision on a paper, - these papers were checked and the votes counted by Ms Jette ABEL, Ms Lore STEINBORN and Mr Sveinung SKJOLD.

ABSTENTION:

To pass the Vote a 2/3 majority would have been necessary. That was not reached; therefore the posts of First Vice-President and Immediate Past President with voting right in the Executive Committee will be retained.

G-3 Nomination Procedures of IFLA Officers (proposal P. JACOBS)

Proposed amendment to the Constitution. Voting members in categories "A" and "B" shall be eligible to hold office after

attending two Grand Council meetings during the six-year period prior to nomination.

Z. MILLER thinks that we should consider all aspects of this motion in relation to the functioning of IFLA. We have discussed two different issues:

Constitution Article II, 17: "Voting members of the Grand Council in Category "A" shall be eligible to hold office in IFLA after attending three meetings of the Grand Council".

1.- Who is eligible?

2.- The nomination procedure.

Members of Category "B" hold office in the Executive Committee. If an officer of the Executive Committee has been elected to another post, he has to give up his post before accepting nomination for another one. Thus the Executive Committee would remain without the full number of its elected officers.

It is Zvi MILLER's opinion that we should consider this point very seriously.

Vince BELLAFIORE points out that there is a report on this matter. We have to follow the Robert Rules.

"Grand Council members shall be eligible to hold office in IFLA after attending two Grand Council meetings during the six-year-period prior to nomination."

VOTE: 35 in favour

4 against

7 abstentions

The motion was carried.

G-4 Proportional representation in the Grand Council - Art. II, 15 of the Constitution

George ANAGNOSTOPOULOS proposed that a committee be appointed to re-examine the present system of proportional representation in the Grand Council and make proposals for a revision of Art. II, 15 of the Constitution.

Paolo SGARAVATTI seconded.

The PRESIDENT noted that since no other opinion was expressed, there was no need for discussion. He appointed a committee consisting of the Vice-Presidents of the three Regions to re-examine the matter and bring back proposals to the next Grand Council.

I-1 A Strategy Plan for the Nineties

Zvi MILLER proposed that a Committee be appointed to prepare a Strategy Plan for the Nineties.

J. Brian CLOUSTON: "What will be the difference of this new Committee from the existing International Committee on Policies?"

Z. MILLER explained that the new Committee would have a specific task, different from the work of the Committee of Policies.

Haruto KOBAYASHI: "The preparations of a Strategy Plan for the future is a job for the Executive Committee. The Grand Council should examine a Plan proposed by the Executive Committee before appointing a committee on this matter." He proposed that the Executive Committee and the Committee on Policies get together and make proposals.

Peter JACOBS supported the proposal to give this job to the Executive Committee and its Strategy Plan to be distributed to the delegates six months before the next Grand Council meeting.

Zvi MILLER: "The Executive Committee is covered by so many other pressing things, but of course it is a matter for the Grand Council to decide."

Peter JACOBS: Proposal: The Executive Committee be charged with the task to prepare a preliminary Strategy Plan for the Nineties, to be sent to the delegates six months prior to the next Grand Council meeting.

Unanimously approved.

I-2 The Report "Our Common Future"

Hal MOGGRIDGE Proposed some changes to his original proposal, which were approved (no discussion).

J PUBLICATIONS

J-1 IFLA NEWS

Dr. WERKMEISTER: "In Jamaica we had to decide to stop the publication of IFLA NEWS because of lack of money. Meanwhile we were able to find some sponsors and so it was possible to print this issue, and we hope we will continue in the future as the IFLA NEWS is a very useful tool for all Landscape Architects and especially for the members of small associations."

Zvi MILLER explained that though there was no decision at the last Grand Council to continue with the publication of the IFLA NEWS, we undertook this responsibility encouraged by the President. Mr MILLER then gave information on the cost of this issue and on its sponsors (Hans DORN, Franz VOGEL, a Spanish School, a German Architect, the AIAP and UNESCO).

Hal MOGGRIDGE: "We should thank those people who raised money."

J-2 IFLA YEARBOOKS

Arno SCHMID refers to his written report. ANNEX XIX.

J-3 IFLA YEARBOOKS - advertising

T. OSMUNDSON: "U.S.A., Japan and Germany support the YEARBOOK with advertisements. All the other countries exporting goods to Landscape Architects should do the same."

The PRESIDENT: "Dr. WERKMEISTER, SCHMID, MILLER, KOBAYASHI, OSMUNDSON and DORN, many thanks for successful work."

Loudly applauded.

K WORLD CONGRESSES AND REGIONAL CONFERENCESK-1 XXV World Congress 1988 - BOSTON

Vincent BELLAFIORE presented Ms Cheryl BARTON who will be ASLA President during the Congress.

Cheryl BARTON announced the 1988 IFLA World Congress in the U.S.A., that will be held in Boston, MA, within the first two weeks in July; she presented the Congress brochure and called for papers. The theme will be "International Perspectives: Collaboration and Communication", and there will be five different programme tracks.

The PRESIDENT: Thanked ASLA for the work done so far with regard to the Congress and hopes it will be fitting also to thank them in advance for the payment of 20% of the Congress registration fees to IFLA.

K-2 XXVI World Congress 1989 - MANILA

Ildefonso SANTOS announced the 1989 IFLA World Congress in the Philippines. The Congress will take place in May-June in Manila and the theme will be "The Realities of the Tropics: A Challenge." Mr SANTOS called for papers and said that arrangements are being made with the PHILIPPINES AIRLINES for a considerable reduction in fares.

K-3 XXVII World Congress 1990 - BERGEN

Sveinung SKJOLD announced the 1990 World Congress in Bergen, Norway, that will take place from August 30 - September 1, and he distributed beautiful posters. The theme of the Congress will be "The Landscape of Coastlines and Fjords."

K-4 Future World Congresses

Zvi MILLER: "There have been cases where due to certain political restrictions imposed by the host country some of our members have not been allowed to participate in an IFLA Congress."

Mr MILLER suggested to approve a resolution concerning the contract forms which have to be signed by the host countries, the 20% of total registration fees of all participants at IFLA World Congresses and Conferences, and a guarantee which assures that all Landscape Architects who are members of associations affiliated to IFLA will be granted entry to the country hosting an IFLA Congress or Conference.

The motion was seconded by Bob WOERNER.

VOTE: unanimously approved.

Zvi MILLER: "1994 is a open year for a Congress in the Western Region."

Peter JACOBS: "We should not plan for too many years ahead."

Mr MILLER: "Some associations, for instance the New Zealand one, wish to know well in advance in order to make their own plans."

Jot CARPENTER: " IFLA Congresses are very expensive for Landscape Architects from quite a few countries. For example, a professor in China cannot even pay his participation fee with a one-year salary. We press people out of congresses."

1995 - IFLA World Congress Hong Kong, approved.
1996 - IFLA World Congress Italy, approved.


Zvi MILLER explained some technical proceedings: The Secretariat informs of changes of addresses in the Membership List: July 1st and December 1st.

We need more publicity for the IFLA YEARBOOK. Member associations should try to get once a year 1/2 page advertisement from professional magazines.


The PRESIDENT thanked all who had attended the Grand Council meeting. Special thanks to Ms Ingrid BOURNE and the French association.
